Emergency Overview

CAUTION! Frozen carbon dioxide – extremely cold solid. Can cause severe frostbite. Vaporizes at normal temperatures without forming a liquid. Vapor can cause rapid suffocation. Vapor can increase respiration and heart rate. Vapor may cause nervous system damage. Vapor may cause dizziness and drowsiness. Self-contained breathing apparatus may be required by rescue workers. Frozen carbon dioxide ---extremely cold solid. Contact can cause frostbite. Use piping and equipment adequately designed to withstand pressures to be encountered. Avoid materials incompatible with cryogenic use, some metals such as carbon steel may fracture easily at low temperature. Vapour can cause rapid suffocation due to oxygen deficiency. Carbon dioxide gas is heavier than air. It tends to accumulate near the floor of an enclosed space, displacing air and pushing it upward. In still air, this process may also occur in low-lying, below-grade areas outdoors. The effect is to crreate an oxygen-deficient atmosphere near the floor or ground. Ventilate space before entry. Verify sufficient oxygen concentration.
